

7th Grade News

7th Grade Writing

The month of April holds the Wisconsin Forward exam. In writing class, we'll do some review to prepare for the exam the week before students take the ELA portion. After that, we'll jump into our argumentative writing unit. Students will notice some commonalities with the structure of the informative essay but some differences as well. Students will begin by learning how to write a claim, counterargument and rebuttal before seeing these come together in a sample piece regarding year-round school. As a whole class, we will research, plan, and prepare a piece on why Freedom should have a community pool. In addition, we will continue our daily work with Patterns of Power. Test #3, open notes, will cover: serial commas, fragments, coordinate adjectives, and colons. A review will be done in class prior to this test.

7th Grade Reading

This month, students will complete a File Folder Book Project, showcasing their creativity and understanding of their chosen books. We will continue to work on separating words into morphemes and using context clues to find the meaning of unknown words. The Wisconsin Forward Exam will have us reviewing testing skills and prepping to show what we know.

After testing, we'll dive into a new unit featuring books written in verse, exploring how authors use poetry to tell powerful stories. It's going to be a great month of reading and learning!

7th Grade Science

Greetings from 7 th Grade Science! As we enter 4 th quarter, we are switching gears to focus on Ecosystem Dynamics and Biodiversity. This unit begins with students examining the interaction with palm oil plantations and the effects on the habitat and ecosystem of where this is grown. We get an appreciation for how frequent palm oil shows up in our every day lives and then connect it back to how the habitat is being altered for palm oil plantations. Along with this, students will be conducting an individual research and presentation project on an endangered species of their choice. The rubric will be coming home for this project soon and presentations will be a few weeks after that.

Bird migration is well under way. Keep your eyes open for returning swallows, sparrows and warblers. The bird of the month is the Yellow-rumped Warbler. This is typically our first of several warblers to return. It is about the size of the sparrow and can be found in most woodlands foraging on insects at the tops of trees.

7th Grade Math

We are still working through a long chapter on "Expressions, Equations, and Inequalities". The students have been doing a great job thus far. Remind your child to make sure they are checking Skyward for missing or absent assignments. Google Classroom has each daily assignment posted if your child is absent from school. Another reminder is that students can sign up for my Tuesday and Thursday Irish Hour to get additional help in math.


7th Grade Social Studies

8th Grade News

Math 8 students took the Unit 4 Assessment on Friday, February 28th. Unit 4 was all about solving equations and systems of equations. Since then, students have started Unit 5, applying what they know about solving equations to a new concept - functions. A function is a special type of rule that assigns one output to each allowable input. They will encounter functions in many different forms - input-output rules, tables, graphs, and equations. Students will work with verbal descriptions of a function arising from a real-world situation, identifying tables, equations, and graphs that represent functions and interpreting information from these representations in terms of the real-world situation.

In Science your 8th graders just rocketed through an out-of-this-world adventure in astronomy! They've already blasted off and orbited around the solar system, navigated galaxies, and even starred in their own exploration of constellations. They learned about gravity, planets, and the life cycle of stars—and yes, they now know more about black holes than you do. Their knowledge? It's shining brighter than a supernova at this point! We're over the moon proud of how they took this astronomical journey and returned as true space cadets, which pretty well sums up most 8th graders in the spring.

From the health office:

Reminders for the school year-

- If vomiting/diarrhea- your student must be 24 hours vomiting/diarrhea free prior to returning to school/co-curriculars
- Fever of 100.4 or greater, your student will be sent home. Your student must be 24 hours fever free without the use of fever reduction medications prior to returning to school.
- All medication must be brought to school/picked up from school by a parent/guardian in its original container. This does include over the counter medications.
- Bring in your emergency medication forms and medications. If a medication is kept on person, a physician must indicate that in the letter/form.
- If there is a change in your student's health condition/diagnosis, physical restrictions, please let the nurse know. Phone is 920-788-7944.
