talk with your child regarding their daily effort and academic progress. The staff at Freedom Middle School expects all students to use their agenda books on a daily basis to record assignments, long term projects, and upcoming tests/quizzes.

## **SATURDAY SCHOOL VS LUNCH CLUB**

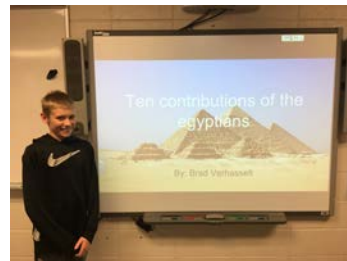
I realize the importance of working with our MS students to develop the skills and a sense of academic responsibility needed to complete daily assignments and hand them in on time. Saturday School is working to some degree but the number of students on the list is alarming. Mr. Bins and I are researching programs at other schools in the Fox Valley area that are addressing this same concern and I would like to tell you about a program called Lunch Club. Students will be put on the lunch club list if they have one or more of the following: (3) late/missing assignments in any single class, (5 total) missing assignments in multiple classes, or an (F) in any class. When students are assigned to lunch club they eat their lunch in a designated classroom and spend the lunch and recess time working on missing assignments. The classroom will be staffed by a certified teacher and they will assist students and hold them accountable. Students will continue to attend the lunch club until they are caught up with all missing work and have passing grades in all classes. Our current Saturday School program addresses the problem of late and missing work after the fact and maybe we need to be proactive and address this concern when it begins? ## **6<sup>TH</sup> GRADE SOCIAL STUDIES**

### **Mr. Fellingner**

We just finished studying all about Egypt including the Old, Middle, and New Kingdoms, as well as, the different Pharaohs in each kingdom. We learned that the Egyptians worshiped different gods such as Re (The sun god), Hapi (The river god), and Osiris (The god of the underworld). The

Egyptians used the process of mummification to preserve the bodies of their dead, especially the pharaohs. They believed that the pharaohs would have an afterlife which explains the building of the great pyramids as tombs which stored many of the pharaoh's possessions, as well as, the Valley of the Kings in which King Tut was discovered. The students built an Egyptian water lifting machine called a shadoof in which they tested with a container of water to see if their design would work. The Egyptian culture contributed many things to past and present cultures in the areas of mathematics, medicine, and the development of an early form of paper called papyrus. The Egyptian projects that the students presented turned out great and were very informative! Now we are going to explore some people who travelled the seas and created a great trading empire. We will study the Phoenicians and their great contributions in navigating and the development of an alphabet!

We will begin the New Year with a Non-Fiction unit.

We will review Non-Fiction text features, analyze many Non-Fiction writing pieces, and write 2 Non-Fiction pieces—one being an informative essay on wave comparison...the other being a Biographical Research project.

In the Biography portion of the Non-Fiction Unit, students will be reading biographies and completing a biography project which includes a Biography Research Report. The goal is for students to select notable people who transcend history for making an impact, gather important details about their choice, and organize it into writing. We will have many books available here for the students to read. Most of the work on the Biography project will be done in school; however, some work will need to be done at home. **6<sup>TH</sup> GRADE MATH**

In 6th grade math we are using the area concepts that the students learned in Unit 2, along with their knowledge of decimals and fractions, to find the surface area of 3 dimensional shapes like prisms and pyramids. In the past Unit 4 has been one of the more challenging units in the 6th grade curriculum. It is relatively short, but the idea of picturing a 3-dimensional shape and all of the sides that exist on that shape (even though some are not directly visible) can be difficult for some students. The next unit we start is algebra. (My favorite!) I will also be out for a few weeks after the holiday break. My daughter is receiving a kidney transplant from my wife on Jan.11, so Mrs. Gaffney will be my substitute. She taught here previously and has used my curriculum in the before. Feel free to contact me at any time with questions or concerns while I am gone and I will get back to you as soon as possible.

**6<sup>TH</sup> GRADE SCIENCE**  
Mr. Runyon



It's hard to believe that it's already the New Year. We have been working hard in science to complete our study of matter and its interactions. The students have learned a great deal about atomic structure, the periodic table, acids and bases, and chemical reactions. We will be finishing that unit with studies of chemical reactions and

identifying mystery substances. Before reviewing and taking a unit final test that goes back almost two and a half months.

As we move forward in the New Year we will begin one of two smaller units on the engineering and design process standards. The students will: ask, imagine, plan, create, improve, and communicate about four projects that will require them to apply and draw on previous knowledge in new and challenging ways. As students test their various projects they will refine their designs, and engaging in the engineering process. This will also serve as an introduction to certain concepts that we will explore in more detail during our study of forces and motion in the following chapter.

## **7<sup>TH</sup> GRADE ENGLISH LANGUAGE ARTS**

**Mrs. Juelich and Mrs. Lingnofski**

Happy New Year! January, in language, will continue our work with informative writing. We will revisit the Burmese Python Essay written in November to familiarize ourselves with the writing process then jump into a new topic: The Great Lakes. We will plan one paragraph together as a class. Students will have the option to plan a second with a partner and will be required to plan two individually. After planning the body paragraphs, students will plan out their introduction, conclusion, and transitions all working towards the organization portion of the scoring rubric. We will write one paragraph of the rough draft together as a class before students finish on their own. Time will be allotted in class to type a final draft. The non-negotiable errors number will change to eight maximum errors prior to necessary revisions. Please see the orange sheet stapled into your child's agenda book to view our middle school non-negotiables.

After this essay, we will move into our final grammatical unit of the year: clauses. This unit reviews compound sentences and introduces complex and compound-complex sentences all based on the understanding of subordinate and independent clauses. This unit will end with the final benchmark test of the year. The concepts tested on these assessments will continue to play a role in our writing for the duration of the school year.

As we begin 2017, in the literature half of the ELA block, seventh graders will be working towards finishing Roll of Thunder, Hear My Cry. We'll finish the last few chapters concentrating on vocabulary, comprehension questions, and discussion questions. Once we finish the book, we'll be doing a RACES writing prompt as we did with the Watsons book, some additional wrap-up activities, and a final test. We'll culminate by watching the movie version of the novel.

For independent reading, the January AR test must be completed and passed by Friday, January 27th. This will be a third quarter grade. Students can use either their November, December, or, if finished early, their January book on this quarter's book project: Tic Tac Toe. Students will have two class work days, January 10th and 11th, prior to the project being due on Friday, January 13th. As students look to choose AR books for February, we will be upping the requirements for points. Students will still be required to read one book per month and pass the tests on that book. However, we ask that books now be a minimum of four points instead of three. All students will be taking the STAR test on January 12th and likely have an updated Lexile level. This will help students find books at their level. The following websites will allow parents and

I hope you and your family had a wonderful holiday break. Prior to the break we finished a difficult chapter on rational numbers. I think the kids are ready to put the fractions aside and work on something different. 😊

Unit 3 is focused on expressions and equations. During the month of January we will be developing a better understanding of expressions and how they can be used to represent real-world situations. Students will be beginning to delve deeper into the world of algebra.

In Pre-Algebra, we also finishing chapter 5 dealing with ratios, proportions, and similar figures. After we finish this chapter, I hope we can spend a little time using what we learned in chapter 5 with some hands on experiences. Chapter 6 will focus on percents; specifically students will be finding percents, percent change, discount and markups, along with simple and compound interest.

If you get a chance, ask your child if they have all the supplies they need for class to make them successful – pencils, red pens, calculators, folder, and a binder.

Once we begin 3<sup>rd</sup> quarter, we will be trying out a new textbook series. Our writing will shift to persuasive writing. Students will work both in class and out to achieve certain requirements and curricular goals.

The students in Algebra completed a project in December where they drew a picture on a coordinate plane using only straight lines, which they then had to write equations for. The pictures all turned out wonderful and look beautiful around my room! Hopefully some of you had the opportunity to see your child's picture. The students then finished up with Chapter 5 right before break where they switched from linear equations to linear inequalities.

The students in Math 8 class were able to do a few authentic assessments as well this month. They created scatter plots to analyze any relationship between their class's heights and arm lengths. Students also came up with questions and surveyed the 8th grade class in order to collect data for a two-way table. As you can see, Chapter 9 was all about statistics. Students did very well in this chapter as this is quite a different branch of mathematics compared to Algebra and Geometry. Students completed quite a few geometry units this quarter. Some of them are ready to switch back to Algebra after the break!

individual responsibility with rollerblading. The students have done very well so far with it. We have included a few pictures of two 7th grade classes in action with relay races and leg workouts with high and low skating.

Our 8th grade is learning a new game called pickleball. It is similar to playing tennis and table tennis. The first few days were just getting to know the rules of the game and getting used to hitting the pickleball. After the first couple class periods the students really caught on and have been enjoying the new game. Once this unit was complete the students have been researching simple machines and creating a Rube Goldberg setup. Students have been designing creating and building their own simple machine to perform a task. All students have shown a great deal of enthusiasm getting to use the cool technology and a wide range of tools in the department.

## **COMPUTER PROGRAMMING**

The students have learned a lot of skills in 7th Grade Programming. Work has been done to develop programming concepts, such as events, parallelism, looping (iterating), and reset. A few technical computer skills have also been picked up along the way. In January, and leading into February we will be using all of those technical skills and concepts to start exploring themes and try our hand at telling stories. The complexity of our work grows to match the skills and abilities that the young programmers continue to practice and develop. Some new programming concepts that we will explore are modularization, conditional decisions, and random behavior.

We will continue to work with and refine the understanding of parallelism, reset, and looping. Your children have been having a lot fun in class using Scratch, but are also learning how to plan and problem solve the entire time. Ask to see their Party Invitation, or It's Alive! and see for yourself what they are up to.
