Make books special Turn reading into something special. Take your kids to the library, help them get their own library card, read with them, and buy them books as gifts. Have a favorite place for books in your home or, even better, put books everywhere.	Do storytelling on the go Take turns adding to a story the two of you make up while riding in a car or bus. Try making the story funny or spooky.		
Picture This! During your next outing or gathering, take action-packed photos, then have your child create captions to go with each picture. Assemble the pictures and captions in a picture book or album, and add speech and thought bubbles to create a personalized - and probably hysterical - graphic novel.	Write, write, write! Ask your child to help you write out the grocery list, a thank you note to Grandma, or to keep a journal of special things that happen at home. When writing, encourage your child to use the letter and sound patterns he is learning at school.		
Don't leave home without it Bring along a book or magazine any time your child has to wait or travel, such as at a doctor's office or a family trip/vacation in a car/plane. Always try to fit in reading!	One more time with feeling When your child has sounded out an unfamiliar word, have him or her re-read that sentence. Often kids are so busy figuring out a word they lose the meaning of what they've just read.		
Pick books that are at the right level Children feel confident and competent when they read books that are "just right." But how do you find a "just right" book? Have your child read the back and front cover, and first page of the book. If there are more than five words that he cannot pronounce or understand in context, the book may be too challenging. Be supportive about finding a more perfect fit. The aim is to give your child lots of successful reading experiences.	Labels of Love Word recognition and vocabulary are important parts of reading. On a rainy day, get some paper and tape and start labeling everything in your home from furniture to small knick-knacks. Reading these labels repeatedly will build your child's mental word bank. If your family is bilingual, create labels in both languages.		
Once is not enough Encourage your child to re-read favorite books and poems. Re-reading helps kids read more quickly. It promotes fluency, allows for them to see and correct their own errors/mistakes while reading and increases the accuracy of reading independently.	Talk, talk, talk! Talk with your child every day about school and things going on around the house. Sprinkle some interesting words into the conversation, and build on words you've talked about in the past.		
Stop and Discuss Stop your child periodically as he or she is reading to ask about the pictures, what your child has read/learned so far, and what your child predicts will happen as he or she continues to read.	Be patient When your child is trying to sound out an unfamiliar word, give him or her time to do so. Remind the child to look closely at the first letter or letters of the word and any parts your child may know.		
Dig deeper into the story Ask your child questions about the story you've just read. Say something like, "Why do you think did that?"	Play word games Have your child sound out the word as you change it- for example: from mat to fat to sat; from sat to sag to sap; and from sap to sip.		
Gently correct your reader When your child makes a mistake, gently point out the letters he or she overlooked or read incorrectly. Ask your child, "does that look right?" or "does that make sense?".	I read to you, you read to me Take turns reading aloud at bedtime. Kids enjoy this special time with their parents.

Tornado Watch - Tornadoes are possible in the area you live in. Listen to the radio or watch the television for updates. Be prepared to move to safety.

Tornado Warning - A tornado has either been spotted by Doppler radar or one is on the ground. You should find shelter immediately!



During a Tornado -

- Go to a basement
- If there is no basement, go to a room in the center of the building, on the lowest floor, with no windows. (A bathroom or closet if possible.)



- Get under the sturdiest piece of furniture if you can.
- If you are in a mobile home, GET OUT! (There is little protection there.)

• Do NOT try to outrun a tornado in a car. It is safer to get out of it and leave it to seek shelter.

• If you are outside, go to a low lying area, like a ditch, and lie down flat.

• Do NOT go near fallen power lines or damaged areas from the tornado.

Tornado Safety Checklist

A tornado is a violently rotating column of air extending from the base of a thunderstorm down to the ground. Tornado intensities are classified on the Fujita Scale with ratings between Fo (weakest) to F5 (strongest). They are capable of completely destroying wellmade structures, uprooting trees and hurling objects through the air like deadly missiles. Although severe tornadoes are more common in the Plains States, tornadoes have been reported in every state.

Tornado Watch

Know the Difference

Tornadoes are possible in and near the watch area. Review and discuss your emergency plans, and check supplies and your safe room. Be ready to act quickly if a warning is issued or you suspect a tornado is approaching. Acting early helps to save lives!

Tornado Warning

A tornado has been sighted or indicated by weather radar. Tornado warnings indicate imminent danger to life and property. Go immediately underground to a basement, storm cellar or an interior room (closet, hallway or bathroom).

What should I do to prepare for a tornado?



- During any storm, listen to local news or a NOAA Weather Radio to stay informed about watches and warnings.
- Know your community's warning system. Communities have different ways of warning residents about tornados, with many having sirens intended for outdoor warning purposes.
- Pick a safe room in your home where household members and pets may gather during a tornado. This should be a basement, storm cellar or an interior room on the lowest floor with no windows.
- Practice periodic tornado drills so that everyone knows what to do if a tornado is approaching.
- □ Consider having your safe room reinforced. Plans for reinforcing an interior room to provide better protection can be found on the FEMA Web site at http://www.fema.gov/ plan/prevent/rms/rmsp453.shtm.
- Prepare for high winds by removing diseased and damaged limbs from trees.
- Move or secure lawn furniture, trash cans, hanging plants or anything else that can be picked up by the wind and become a projectile.
- □ Watch for tornado danger signs:
 - Dark, often greenish clouds-a
 - phenomenon caused by hail
 - Wall cloud—an isolated lowering of the base of a thunderstorm
 - Cloud of debris
 - Large hail
 - Funnel cloud—a visible rotating
 - extension of the cloud base
 - Roaring noise

What should I do if a tornado is threatening?



- The safest place to be is an underground shelter, basement or safe room.
- □ If no underground shelter or safe room is available, a small, windowless interior room or hallway on the lowest level of a sturdy building is the safest alternative.
 - Mobile homes are not safe during tornadoes or other severe winds.
 - Do not seek shelter in a hallway or
 - bathroom of a mobile home.
 - If you have access to a sturdy shelter or a vehicle, abandon your mobile home immediately.
 - Go to the nearest sturdy building or shelter immediately, using your seat belt if driving.
 - Do not wait until you see the tornado.

□ If you are caught outdoors, seek shelter in a basement, shelter or sturdy building. If you cannot quickly walk to a shelter:

- Immediately get into a vehicle, buckle your seat belt and try to drive to the closest sturdy shelter.
- If flying debris occurs while you are driving, pull over and park, Now you have the following options as a last resort:
 - Stay in the car with the seat belt on. Put your head down below the windows, covering with your hands and a blanket if possible.
 - If you can safely get noticeably lower than the level of the roadway, exit your car and lie
- in that area, covering your head with your hands. • Your choice should be driven by
- Your choice should be driven b your specific circumstances.



- Continue listening to local news or a NOAA Weather Radio for updated information and instructions.
- If you are away from home, return only when authorities say it is safe to do so.
- Wear long pants, a long-sleeved shirt and sturdy shoes when examining your walls, doors, staircases and windows for damage.
- Watch out for fallen power lines or broken gas lines and report them to the utility company immediately.
- □ Stay out of damaged buildings.
- Use battery-powered flashlights when examining buildings—do NOT use candles.
- □ If you smell gas or hear a blowing or hissing noise, open a window and get everyone out of the building quickly and call the gas company or fire department.
- Take pictures of damage, both of the building and its contents, for insurance claims.
- Use the telephone only for emergency calls.
- Keep all of your animals under your direct control.
- Clean up spilled medications, bleaches, gasoline or other flammable liquids that could become a fire hazard.
- Check for injuries. If you are trained, provide first aid to persons in need until emergency responders arrive.

If your community experiences a tornado, or any disaster, register on the American Red Cross Safe and Well Web site available through **Red Cross org** to let your family and friends know about your welfare. If you don't have internet access, call **1-866-GRT-INFO** to register yourself and your family.
