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INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT

Board of Education Freedom Area School District Freedom, Wisconsin

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of the governmental activities, each major fund, and the aggregate remaining fund information of Freedom Area School District (District), as of and for the year ended June 30, 2008, which collectively comprise the District's basic financial statements as listed in the table of contents. These financial statements are the responsibility of the District's management. Our responsibility is to express opinions on these financial statements based on our audit.

We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards* issued by the Comptroller General of the United States. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall financial statement presentation. We believe that our audit provides a reasonable basis for our opinion. In our opinion, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of the governmental activities, each major fund, and the aggregate remaining fund information of Freedom Area School District as of June 30, 2008, and the respective changes in financial position for the year then ended in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

In accordance with Government Auditing Standards, we have also issued a report dated November 18, 2008, on our consideration of Freedom Area School District's internal control over financial reporting and on our tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts, and grant agreements. The purpose of that report is to describe the scope of that testing and not to provide an opinion on the internal control over financial reporting or on compliance. That report is an integral part of an audit performed in accordance with Government Auditing Standards and should be read in conjunction with this report in considering the results of the audit.

The management's discussion and analysis on pages 3 through 11 is not a required part of the basic financial statements but is supplementary information required by accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America. We have applied certain limited procedures, which consisted principally of inquiries of management regarding the methods of measurement and presentation of the required supplementary information. However, we did not audit the information and express no opinion on it.

Our audit was conducted for the purpose of forming opinions on the financial statements that collectively comprise the District's basic financial statements. The combining financial statements are presented for purposes of additional analysis and are not a required part of the basic financial statements.

The accompanying schedules of expenditures of federal and state awards are presented for purposes of additional analysis as required by U.S. Office of Management and Budget Circular A-133, *Audits of States*, *Local Governments, and Non-Profit Organizations*, and are also not a required part of the basic financial statements of Freedom Area School District. The combining financial statements and the schedule of expenditures of federal and state awards have been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the basic financial statements and, in our opinion, are fairly stated in all material respects in relation to the basic financial statements taken as a whole.

MANAGEMENT'S DISCUSSION AND ANALYSIS

For the Year Ended June 30, 2008

This section of Freedom Area School District's (District) annual financial report presents our discussion and analysis of the District's financial performance during the fiscal year ended June 30, 2008. Please read it in conjunction with the District's financial statements, which follow this section.

FINANCIAL HIGHLIGHTS

- General Fund (Fund 10) fund balance increased \$270,464. The fund balance is 10.5% of Fund 10 expenditures. The original budget was adopted with the expectation of breaking even. The Board of Education policy is to have a fund balance of greater than 5%.
- Actual revenues of \$14,485,065 were \$4,541 more than final budgeted revenues of \$14,480,524. Actual expenditures of \$14,214,601 were \$232,551 less than the final budgeted expenditures of \$14,447,152. Expenditures were within 98.13% of revenue.
- The Freedom Area School District continues to address health insurance costs. During negotiations for the teacher's union it was agreed that they would switch to a preferred provider plan from the front end deductible plan. Also, they were offered the opportunity to take a cash benefit in lieu of health insurance. During this time period ten teachers took advantage of this plan. The savings to the District for the six month time period it was in place was about \$75,000. This plan will continue to be a savings to the District as health insurance increases.
- During 2007-2008 the Freedom Area School District had its first actuarial study completed by Key Benefit Concepts to analyze the District's Other Post Employment Benefits (OPEB). The results of this study are reported in these financial statements. Key Benefit Concepts estimated that the Annual Required Contribution ("ARC") for the most recent period was \$766,675. The ARC is the present value of future benefits accrued by the workforce for the current year and may also reflect the amortization of unfunded liabilities attributed to prior years. The District's funding obligations for the OPEB liability is to pay current expenses as they become due. There is no legal or accounting requirement that the District pay in any year an amount in excess of current benefits. This may be something that the District looks into in the future.

OVERVIEW OF THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

This annual financial report consists of two parts - management's discussion and analysis and the basic financial statements (district-wide and fund statements), including notes to the financial statements.

The basic financial statements consist of two kinds of statements that present different views of the District's financial activities.

- The <u>Statement of Net Assets</u> and <u>Statement of Activities</u> provide information on a district-wide basis. These statements present an aggregate view of the District's finances. District-wide statements contain useful long-term information as well as information for the just-completed fiscal year.
- The <u>Statement of Net Assets</u> compares assets to liabilities to give an overall view of the financial health of the District.
- The <u>Statement of Activities</u> defines the District's expenses by function and illustrates the total that is offset by corresponding revenues charges for services and/or operating grants and contributions. General revenues and extraordinary credits are identified. The result is total net expense offset by general and miscellaneous revenue recognizing the change in net assets for the District from the previous year.
- The remaining statements: <u>Balance Sheet Governmental Funds</u> and <u>Statement of Revenues</u>, <u>Expenditures</u>, <u>and Changes in Fund Balances Governmental Funds</u> focus on individual parts of the District. Fund statements generally report operations in more detail than the district-wide statements and support the statement of net assets.
- The <u>Notes to Financial Statements</u> provide further explanation of some of the information in the statements and provide additional disclosures so statement users have a complete picture of the District's financial activities and position.
- <u>Required Supplementary Information</u> further explains and supports the financial statements by including a comparison of the District's budget data for the year and all reports in the financial statements through and including the financial notes.
- <u>Additional Supplemental Information</u> provides information specific to nonmajor governmental funds such as the Food Service and Packaged Cooperative Funds.
- The major features of the District's financial statements, including the portion of the activities reported and type of information contained is shown in the following table. (Table #1)

Statement of Net Assets: (Table #2)

The District's overall financial status, as reflected in total net assets, increased by \$864,118 to \$2,132,919. The District reported total assets of \$19.08M, of which \$11.73M are noncurrent assets. The District reported total liabilities of \$16.95M, of which \$10.51M are long-term liabilities. Details of the restatement of net assets as of July 1, 2007 can be found in Note # 13 of the financial statements.

Revenues: (Table #3)

- For FY 08, the District received \$17.53M in revenue. This is an increase of 5% or \$790,336 over the previous year. State equalization aid increased from the prior year by \$197,639 to \$9.72M and property taxes increased by \$430,578 to \$5.32M. For FY 08, 55% of total revenue came from state equalization aid and 30% came from local school property taxes. The District received approximately 13% of all revenue in the form of specific use state aid, federal grants, contributions from individuals, and direct fees for services.
- Individuals, who directly participated or received benefits from a program offering, contributed \$813,819 of the cost, an increase of \$82,835 from the prior year. Book and activity fees, admissions to athletic events, school lunch fees, open enrollment tuition, and building rental fees are included here.
- Individuals and federal and state government subsidized certain programs with grants and contributions of \$1.38M, which is an increase of \$36,113 from the prior year. Special education, transportation, breakfast, and lunch aids are included here.
- The District received \$287,800 in other income, an increase of \$43,171 from the prior year. For FY08, 77% or \$221,672 of other income was received as interest income.

Expenses: (Table #3)

• For FY 08, the District's total expenditure amount was \$16.67M. This is an increase of \$146,197 from the prior year. For FY 08, 52% was directed to instruction and 35% was directed to support services. Nonprogram expenditure amounts were 3% of the total. The food service program and community service represents 3% and costs for debt service represented 5% of total expenditures.

Net Cost of Government Activities: (Table #4)

- Total cost of all governmental activities was \$16.67M.
- The net cost of governmental activities, \$14.47M, was financed by general revenues, which are primarily made up of state equalization aid, \$9.72M, and property taxes, \$5.32M. Miscellaneous and investment earnings accounted for \$287,800. In addition, District operations were subsidized by \$2.20M, which was collected through direct fees, operating grants, and contributions.

General Fund Budgetary Comparison:

- Consistent with current state statutes and regulations, an original budget is adopted in October to reflect the actual revenue cap and state aid certification. The District did not modify its original budget in 2007-08. The statement of revenues, expenditures, and changes in fund balances-budget and actual for the general and special education fund shows a comparison of the budget versus actual.
- Actual results for the year showed an excess of revenues over expenditures of \$270,464. Total revenues exceeded budget by \$4,541. Total expenditures were less than budget by \$232,551. Actual net change in fund balance exceeded budgeted net change in fund balance by \$237,092.

Fund Balances:

- The District shows a total for all fund balances of \$2.03M as of June 30, 2008.
- \$1.50M is in the General Fund (Fund 10). The District utilizes this fund balance for funding short-term operations.
- \$248,103 in the Debt Service Fund (Funds 38 & 39) is reserved to make future payments on long-term debt.

Capital Asset and Debt Administration:

Capital Assets

• At year-end, the District had \$11.73M in Capital Assets. Further detail can be found in Note #3 in the financial statements.

Long-Term Debt

• At year-end, the District had \$11.53M in Long-Term Obligations. Further detail can be found in Note #6 in the financial statements.

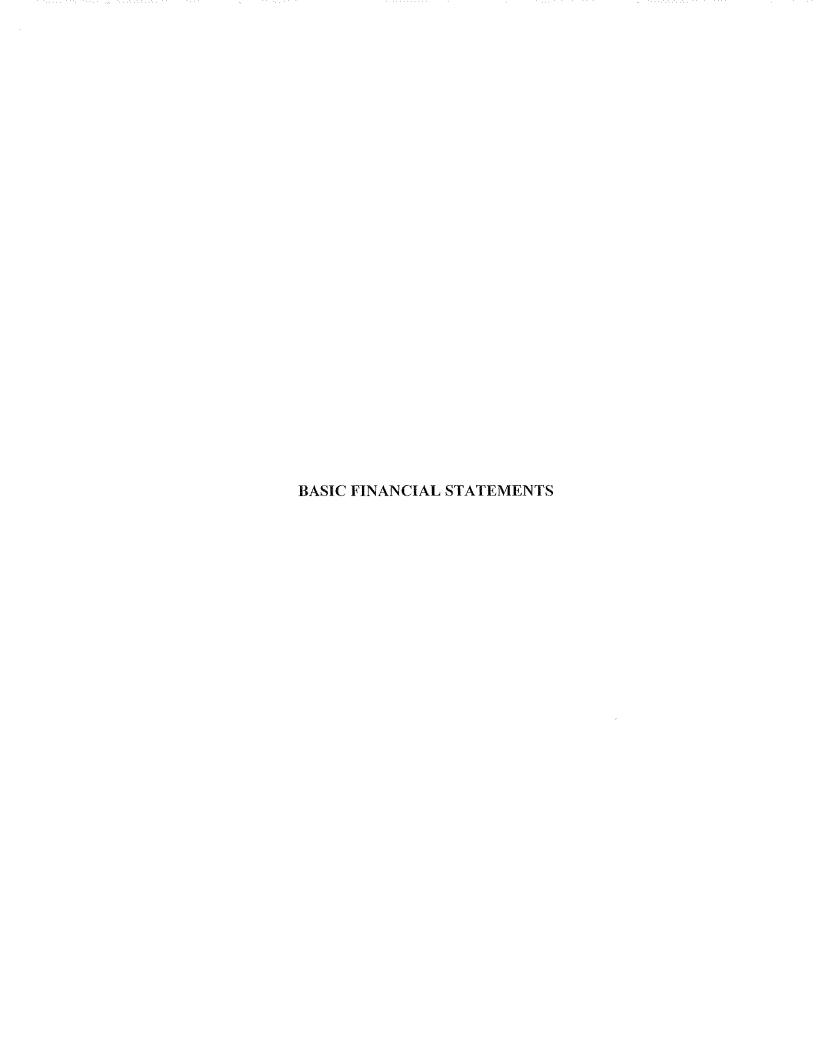
Economic Factors That Will Have an Impact on the Future of the District:

There are several things occurring in the District that will have significance on the future of the District. These items should be kept in mind while reading the financial statements and looking at the current status of the District.

- One of the main factors that will have economic impact on the future of the District will be how the Wisconsin Legislature continues to fund education. Each year as the state budget is being developed; educational institutions cannot be sure what the impact will be to their budget. As school districts live under revenue limits, the numbers used to generate that limit are critical to the operations of public education.
- The second factor that will have economic impact on the District is the number of students that are enrolled. This number is what is used to generate the revenue limit and amount of money that can be raised to fund the schools. This number also plays into decisions regarding the District's facilities.
- The District is currently working on paying off the piece of land it purchased on County Road N. At this time it is being rented by an area farmer. A committee will be formed in the next two years to study needs and usage of the facilities. It is anticipated that development will be five to seven years out at this time unless enrollment spikes higher than anticipated.
- During the 2009-2010 fiscal year, the District will be adding all day Kindergarten. This will impact many areas of the budget. There will be significant start up costs related to equipment and materials needs. There will need to be restructuring to the playground area as well as transportation routes. Additional staff will also need to be hired. While having all day Kindergarten will also bring additional revenue to the District, it will take three years for the full effect. In the meantime it is possible that the District will need to draw on its fund balance to aid in funding this new venture.

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

Note 1. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies:

The financial statements of the Freedom Area School District (District) have been prepared in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles (GAAP) as applied to government units. The Government Accounting Standards Board (GASB) is the accepted standard-setting body for establishing governmental accounting principles and financial reporting principles. The significant accounting principles and policies utilized by the District are described below.

A. Reporting Entity

The Freedom Area School District was established on July 3, 1963, as a common school district. The District, governed by a seven member elected board, operates grades Pre-K through 12 and is comprised of all or parts of six taxing districts. The District receives funding from local, state, and federal government sources and must comply with the concomitant requirements of these funding source entities. However, the District is not included in any other governmental "reporting entity" as defined by the GASB pronouncement since it has decision making authority, the authority to levy taxes, the power to designate management, the ability to significantly influence operations, and it is primarily accountable for fiscal matters. In addition, there are no component units, as defined in GASB Statement 14 that are included in the District's reporting entity.

B. Fund Accounting

The accounts of the District are organized on the basis of funds and account groups, as prescribed by the Wisconsin Department of Public Instruction, for elementary and secondary school districts, each of which is considered a separate accounting entity. The operations of each fund are accounted for with a separate set of self-balancing accounts that comprise its assets, liabilities, fund equity, revenues, and expenditures as appropriate. District resources are allocated to and accounted for in individual funds based upon the purposes for which they are to be spent and the means by which spending activities are controlled.

The District operates the following major governmental funds:

General Fund - The General Fund is the operating fund of the District. It is used to account for all financial resources of the District except those required to be accounted for in other funds.

Special Education Fund - The Special Education Fund is used to account for the proceeds of the handicapped program and is legally restricted to expenditures for specified purposes.

Debt Service Fund - The Debt Service Fund is used to account for the accumulation of resources for, and the payment of, general long-term debt principal, interest, and related costs.

The District operates the following nonmajor governmental funds:

Special Revenue Funds - Special Revenue Funds are used to account for the proceeds of specific revenue sources (other than expendable trusts or capital projects) that are legally restricted to expenditures for specified purposes. The District uses Special Revenue Funds to account for its TEACH, food service, and community service funds.

Capital Projects Funds - Capital Projects Funds are used to account for financial resources to be used for the acquisition or construction of capital facilities (other than those financed by Trust Funds).

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS - CONTINUED

Note 1. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies - Continued:

Additionally, the District reports the following fund types:

Trust and Agency Funds - Trust and Agency Funds are used to account for assets held by the District in a trustee capacity or as an agent for individuals, private organizations, other governments, and/or other funds. These include private-purpose trust, employee flexible benefit, and agency funds. Donations for scholarships and other bequests are accounted for in private-purpose trust funds. Private-purpose trust funds are accounted for in essentially the same manner as proprietary funds. Employee benefit trust funds are setup to put aside monies for future post retirement benefits. They are irrevocable and can only be dissolved after all the trust assets have been used for their intended purpose. Activities of student organizations are accounted for in an agency fund. Agency funds are custodial in nature (assets equal liabilities) and do not involve measurement of results of operations.

C. Basis of Presentation

Government-wide Financial Statements

The statement of net assets and the statement of activities display information about the District as a whole. These statements include the financial activities of the primary government, except for fiduciary funds. These statements distinguish between governmental and business-type activities of the District. The District did not have any business-type activities in place at June 30, 2008.

The government-wide statements are prepared using the economic resources measurement focus. This is the same approach used in the preparation of proprietary fund financial statements but differs from the manner in which governmental fund financial statements are prepared. Governmental fund financial statements, therefore, include a reconciliation between the government-wide statements and the governmental fund statements.

The statement of net assets presents the financial condition of the governmental activities of the District at year-end. The statement of activities presents a comparison between the direct expenses and program revenues for each function or program of the governmental activities. Direct expenses are those that are specifically associated with a service, program, or department and, therefore, are clearly identifiable to a particular function. Program revenues include amounts paid by the recipient of goods or services offered by the program and grants and contributions that are restricted to meeting the operational or capital requirements of a particular program. All taxes and revenues not classified as program revenues are presented as general revenues of the District.

Fund Financial Statements

Fund financial statements report detailed information about the District. Their focus is on major funds rather than reported funds by type. Each major governmental fund is presented in a single column, and all nonmajor funds are aggregated into one column. Fiduciary funds are reported by fund type.

The accounting and financial reporting treatment applied to a fund is determined by its measurement focus. All governmental funds are accounted for using a flow of current financial resources measurement focus. With this measurement focus, only current assets and current liabilities are generally included on the balance sheet. Operating statements of these funds present increases (i.e., revenues and other financing sources) and decreases (i.e., expenditures and other financing uses) in net current assets.

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS - CONTINUED

Note 1. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies - Continued:

D. Basis of Accounting

The district-wide financial statements use the economic resources measurement focus and the accrual basis of accounting, as do the fiduciary fund financial statements. Revenues are recorded when earned, and expenses are recorded when a liability is incurred, regardless of the timing of the related cash flows. Property taxes are recognized as revenues in the year in which they are levied. Grants and similar items are recognized as revenue as soon as all eligibility requirements imposed by the provider have been met.

Governmental fund financial statements use current financial resources measurement focus and the modified accrual basis of accounting. With this measurement focus, only current assets, current liabilities, and fund balances are included on the balance sheet. Operating statements of these funds present net increase and decreases in current assets (i.e., revenues and other financing sources and expenditures and other financing uses).

The modified accrual basis of accounting recognizes revenues in the accounting period in which they become both measurable and available, and it recognizes expenditures in the accounting period in which the fund liability is incurred, if measurable, except for unmatured interest and principal on long-term debt, which is recognized when due. The expenditures related to certain compensated absences and claims and judgments are recognized when the obligations are expected to be liquidated with expendable available financial resources. The District considers all revenues available if they are collectible within 60 days after year-end.

Revenues from local sources consist primarily of property taxes. Property tax revenues and revenues received from the State and Federal government are recognized under the susceptible-to-accrual concept. Miscellaneous revenues are recorded as revenue when received in cash because they are generally not measurable and available.

E. Budgetary Accounting

Operating budgets are adopted each fiscal year for all governmental funds in accordance with Section 65.90 of the Wisconsin Statutes. The legally adopted budget and budgetary expenditure control is exercised at the object level in the general fund and at the total expenditures level for all other funds. Reported budget amounts are as originally adopted or as amended by School Board resolution.

F. Cash and Investments

The District's cash and cash equivalents consist of cash on hand, demand deposits, and short-term investments with original maturities of three months or less from date of acquisition. All funds share common (pooled) checking and investment accounts unless regulations require separate investment accounts.

All investments are stated at fair market value. Determination of fair value for investment in the StateTreasurer's investment pool is based on information provided by the State of Wisconsin Investment Board.

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS - CONTINUED

Note 1. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies - Continued:

G. Property Taxes

The aggregate District tax levy is apportioned and certified by November 6 of the current fiscal year for collection to comprising municipalities based on the immediate past October 1 full or "equalized" taxable property values. As permitted by a collecting municipality's ordinance, taxes may be paid in full or two or more installments with the first installment payable the subsequent January 31, and the final payment no later than the following July 31. On or before January 15, and by the 20th of each subsequent month thereafter, the District is paid by the collecting municipalities its proportionate share of tax collections received through the last day of the preceding month. On or before August 20, the County Treasurer makes full settlement to the District for any remaining balance. The County assumes all responsibility for delinquent real property taxes.

Property taxes are recognized as revenue in the period that the taxes are levied as if they are due in the current year and available to pay current liabilities. The 2007 tax levy is used to finance operations of the District's fiscal year ended June 30, 2008. All property taxes are considered due on January 1, 2008, when an enforceable lien is assessed against the property and the taxpayer is liable for the taxes. All taxes are collected within 60 days of June 30 and are available to pay current liabilities.

H. Receivables

Receivables at June 30, 2008, consisted of taxes, accounts, and governmental grants and entitlements. All receivables are considered collectible in full due to the ability to foreclose for the nonpayment of taxes and the stable condition of federal and state programs.

I. Inventories and Prepaid Supplies

Inventories and prepaid supplies are valued at the lower of cost (first-in, first-out) or market. Inventory in the Governmental Funds consists of expendable supplies held for consumption. The cost is recorded as an expenditure at the time individual inventory items are consumed.

J. Accumulated Unpaid Vacation, Sick Pay, and Other Employee Benefit Amounts

Vacation benefits are accrued as a liability if the employee's right to receive compensation is attributable to services already rendered, and it is probable that the employer will compensate the employees for the benefits through paid time off or some other means. Sick leave benefits are accrued as a liability using the vesting method. The liability is based on the sick leave accumulated at June 30 by those employees who are currently eligible to receive termination payments and those employees for whom it is probable will become eligible to receive termination benefits in the future. The criteria for determining the vacation and sick leave liability is derived from Board policy, negotiated agreements, and state laws.

The entire compensated absence liability is reported on the district-wide financial statements. For governmental fund financial statements, the amount of accumulated vacation and sick leave of employees has been recorded as a current liability to the extent that the amounts are expected to be paid using expendable available resources. The balance of the liability is not recorded.

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS - CONTINUED

Note 1. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies - Continued:

Ten school days of sick leave credit is accrued to each teacher per year for personal illness. All teachers in the District begin each year with 10 fully vested sick days. All teachers can accumulate up to a maximum of 115 days. Each teacher is credited \$10.00 per day of accumulated sick leave remaining upon retirement. Only teachers who have taught a minimum of 15 years in the Freedom District and have reached age 55 are eligible for this benefit.

Support staff is credited with up to ten days of sick leave per year for personal illness. These employees can accumulate up to a maximum of 100 days. Eligible employees are credited \$10.00 per day of accumulated sick leave remaining upon retirement. Only bargaining unit members who have been employed by the District for a minimum of 15 years are eligible for this benefit.

K. Capital Assets and Depreciation

General capital assets are reported in the government-wide statement of net assets but not in the fund financial statements.

All capital assets are capitalized at cost (or estimated historical cost) and updated for additions and retirement during the year. Donated fixed assets are recorded at their fair market value as of the date received. The District follows the policy of not capitalizing assets with a cost of less than \$1,000 and a useful life of less than one year, unless their exclusion as a group would make the financial statements materially misleading. All reported capital assets, with the exception of land, are depreciated. Improvements are depreciated over the remaining useful lives of the related capital asset. Depreciation is computed using the straight-line method over the following useful lives:

L. Interfund Activity

Short-term interfund loans are classified as interfund receivables/payables in the fund financial statements. These amounts are eliminated in the statement of net assets.

M. Accrued Liabilities and Long-term Debt

All accrued liabilities and long-term debt are reported in the government-wide financial statements.

For governmental fund financial statements, accrued liabilities are generally reported as a governmental fund liability if due for payment as of the balance sheet date, regardless of whether they will be liquidated with current financial resources. However, claims and judgments and compensated absences paid from governmental funds are reported as a liability in the fund financial statements only for the portion expected to be financed from expendable available financial resources. Long-term debt paid from governmental funds is not recognized as a liability in the fund financial statements until due.

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS - CONTINUED

Note 1. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies - Continued:

N. Governmental Fund Balance Reserves

The District records reservations for portions of governmental fund balances, which are legally segregated for specific future use or which do not represent available spendable resources and are therefore not available for appropriation. Unreserved fund balance indicates the portion of the fund balance that is available for appropriation in future periods.

O. Restricted Resources

The District applies restricted resources first when an expense is incurred for purposes for which both restricted and unrestricted net assets are available.

P. Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with U.S. generally accepted accounting principles requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect certain reported amounts and disclosures. Accordingly, actual results could differ from those estimates.

Note 2. Cash and Investments:

The Debt Service Fund and Capital Projects Fund account for their transactions through separate and distinct bank and investment accounts as required by State Statues. In addition, the Trust and Agency Fund use separate and distinct accounts. All other funds share in common bank and investment accounts.

Deposits: Deposits in banks are insured by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation (FDIC) in the amount of \$100,000 for demand deposits and \$100,000 for time deposits. In addition, the State of Wisconsin has a State Guarantee Fund that provides a maximum of \$400,000 per entity above the amount provided by the FDIC. However, due to the relatively small size of the Guarantee Fund in relation to the total coverage, total recovery of losses may not be available.

As of June 30, 2008, the carrying amount of the District's deposits was \$229,363 and the bank balance was \$594,908. Of the bank balance, \$136,780 was covered by FDIC insurance and \$400,000 was covered by the State Guarantee Fund. Additionally, one bank has pledged securities valued at \$2,933,507. At year-end, all deposits were either insured or collateralized.

The carrying amount of the District's deposits includes \$130,231 held for student activity funds.

The District is required to invest its funds in accordance with Wisconsin Statute 66.0603(1m). The School Board has adopted an investment policy pursuant to these statutes that allows the District to invest in the following:

Time Deposits

Securities guaranteed by the U. S. Government

Securities of Wisconsin Municipal Units

Securities of Wisconsin Educational and School Districts Local Government Investment Pool

Bonds issued by a local exposition district

Bonds issued by a local professional baseball park district

Bonds issued by a local professional stadium district

Bonds issued by the University of Wisconsin Hospitals and Clinics Authority

Note 2. Cash and Investments - Continued:

Bonds issued by a local cultural arts district

Securities which mature or may be tendered for purchase at the option of the holder within not more than 7 years of the date on which it is acquired and received the highest or second highest rating category assigned by Standard & Poor's corporation, Moody's investors service, or other similar nationally recognized rating agency.

Securities of an open-ended management investment company or investment trust, if the investment company does not charge a sales load, is registered under the investment company act of 1940, and the portfolio is limited to bonds and securities issued by the federal government, bonds that are guaranteed by the federal government, or repurchase securities that are fully collateralized by bonds or securities.

The investment in short-term borrowing contracts is not insured or collateralized unless the rating falls below Aa. As of June 30, 2008, the rating was Aa or higher and the contracts were not insured or collateralized.

Although not categorized as deposits, the investment in the State Treasurer's investment pool is insured against defaults in principal payments by Financial Security Assurance Incorporated.

At June 30, 2008, \$4,470,000 of outstanding general obligation bonds is considered defeased.

The 2007 equalized valuation of the District as certified by the Wisconsin Department of Revenue is \$655,477,570. The legal debt limit and margin of indebtedness as of June 30, 2008, in accordance with Section 67.03(1)(b) of the Wisconsin Statutes follows:

Note 9. Defined Benefit Pension Plan:.

All eligible School District employees participate in the Wisconsin Retirement System (WRS), a cost-sharing multiple-employer defined benefit public employee retirement system (PERS). All permanent employees expected to work over 600 hours a year (440 hours for teachers) are eligible to participate in the WRS. Covered employees in the General/Teacher/Educational Support Personnel category are required by statute to contribute 6.0% of their salary (3.0% for executives and elected officials, 5.1% for protective occupations with Social Security, and 3.4% for protective occupations without Social Security) to the plan. Employers may make these contributions to the plan on behalf of employees. Employers are required to contribute an actuarially determined amount necessary to fund the remaining projected cost of future benefits.

The payroll for Freedom Area School District employees covered by the system for the year ended June 30, 2008, was \$5,874,414; the employer's total payroll was \$7,341,491. The total required contribution for the year ended June 30, 2008, was \$622,688, which consisted of \$270,223 or 4.6% of payroll from the employer and \$352,465, or 6.0% of payroll from employees. Total contributions for the years ended June 30, 2007 and 2006, were \$590,209 and \$601,135, respectively, equal to the required contributions for each year.

Employees who retire at or after age 65 (62 for elected officials and 54 for protective occupation employees with less than 25 years of service, 53 for protective occupation employees with more than 25 years of service) are entitled to receive a retirement benefit. Employees mat retire at age 55 (50 for protective occupation employees) and receive actuarially reduced benefits. The factors influencing the benefit are: (1) final average earnings, (2) years of creditable service, and (3) a formula factor. A final average earnings is the average of the employee's three highest years earnings. Employees terminating covered employment and submitting application before becoming eligible for a retirement benefit may withdraw their contributions and, by doing so, forfeit all rights to any subsequent benefits. For employees beginning participation on or after January 1, 1990, and no longer actively employed on or after April 24, 1998, creditable service in each of five years is required for eligibility for a retirement annuity. Participants employed prior to 1990 and on or after April 24, 1998 are immediately vested.

The WRS also provides death and disability benefits for employees. Eligibility and the amount of all benefits are determined under Chapter 40 of Wisconsin Statutes. The WRS issues an annual financial report that may be obtained by writing to the Department of Employee Trust Funds, P.O. Box 7931, Madison, WI 53707-7931.

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS - CONTINUED

Note 10. Other Post Employment Benefits:

The District's post employment medical plan is a single-employer defined benefit healthcare plan administered by the District. The plan provides medical, dental, and life insurance benefits to eligible retirees and their spouses. The authority to establish and amend benefit provisions is with the school board. There is no financial report issued by the plan.

The accrual basis of accounting is used. The fair market value of assets is determined by the market value of assets, if any, paid by a willing buyer to a willing seller.

The contribution requirements of the District are established and may be amended by the school board. The required contribution is based on an actuarial study. For the fiscal year ended June 30, 2008, the District contributed \$485,815.

The District's annual other post employment benefit (OPEB) cost is calculated based on the annual required contribution (ARC), an amount actuarially determined in accordance with the parameters of GASB Statement 45. The ARC represents a level of funding, if paid on an ongoing basis, projected to cover the normal cost as well as the amortized unfunded actuarial liability. The following table shows the components of the District's annual OPEB for the year, the amount actually contributed, and the changes to the District's net OPEB obligation.

As of June 30, 2008, the most recent actuarial valuation date, the plan was 0 percent funded. The actuarial accrued liability for benefits was \$7,535,977, and the actuarial value of assets was \$0. This resulted in an unfunded actuarial liability (UAAL) of \$7,535,977. The covered payroll (annual payroll of active employees covered by the plan) was \$5,874,414 and the ratio of UAAL to the covered payroll was 128.28 percent.

Actuarial valuations of an ongoing plan involve estimates of the value of reported amounts and assumptions about the probability of occurrence of events far into the future. Examples include assumptions about future employment, mortality, and the healthcare cost trends. Amounts determined regarding the funded status of the plan and the annual required contributions of the employer are subject to continual revision as actual results are compared with past expectations and new estimates are made about the future. The schedule of funding progress, presented as required supplemental information, presents multi-year trend information about whether the actuarial value of plan assets is increasing or decreasing over time relative to actuarial accrued liabilities for benefits.

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS - CONTINUED

Note 10. Other Post Employment Benefits - Continued:

Projection of benefits for financial reporting purposes are based on the substantive plan (the plan as understood by the employer and the plan members) and include the types of benefits provided at the time of each valuation and the historical pattern of sharing the benefit cost between the employer and plan members to that point. The actuarial methods and assumptions used include techniques that are designed to reduce the effects of short-term volatility in actuarial accrued liabilities and the actuarial value of assets, consistent with the long-term perspective of the calculations.

For the actuarial valuation, the projected unit credit method was used. The actuarial assumption included a 6.5 percent investment rate of return (net of administrative expenses), which is a blended rate of the expected long-term investment returns on plan assets and on the employer's own investments calculated based on the funded level of the plan at the valuation date and a healthcare cost trend rate of 11.5 percent initially, decreasing by 1 percent per year down to 5.5 percent and then a decrease of .5 percent for one year down to 5.0 percent. The dental care inflation rate is set at 4 percent. Both rates include a 4 percent inflation assumption. The UAAL is being amortized as a level percentage of projected payroll. The remaining amortization period at June 30, 2008, was 30 years.

Note 11. Limitation on School District Revenues:

Wisconsin Statutes limit the amount of revenues that school districts may derive from general school aids and property taxes unless a higher amount is approved by a referendum. This limitation does not apply to revenues needed for the payment of any general obligation debt service (including refinanced debt) authorized by either of the following:

- A resolution of the school board or by a referendum prior to August 12, 1993
- A referendum on or after August 12, 1993

Note 12. Contingent Liabilities:

Risk management - The District is exposed to various risks of loss, including torts; theft of, damage to, and destruction of assets; errors and omissions; injuries to employees; and natural disasters. The District purchases commercial insurance coverage for most of these risks. There were no reductions in purchased coverage for the year ended June 30, 2008. No settlements exceeded insured amounts in the last three fiscal years.

Litigation - From time to time, the District is party to various pending claims and legal proceedings. Although the outcome of such matters cannot be forecasted with certainty, it is the opinion of management and counsel that the likelihood is remote, due in part to insurance coverage, that any other such claims or proceedings will have a material effect on the District's financial position.

Note 13. Prior Period Adjustment:

NOTE 1 - BASIS OF PRESENTATION

We have audited the financial statements of the governmental activities, each major fund, and the aggregate remaining fund information of Freedom Area School District (District), as of and for the year ended June 30, 2008, which collectively comprise the District's basic financial statements and have issued our report thereon dated November 18, 2008. We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States.

Internal Control Over Financial Reporting

In planning and performing our audit, we considered Freedom Area School District's internal control over financial reporting as a basis for designing our auditing procedures for the purpose of expressing our opinion on the financial statements, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the District's internal control over financial reporting. Accordingly, we do not express an opinion on the effectiveness of the District's internal control over financial reporting.

Our consideration of internal control over financial reporting was for the limited purpose described in the preceding paragraph and would not necessarily identify all deficiencies in internal control over financial reporting that might be significant deficiencies or material weaknesses. However, as discussed below, we identified certain deficiencies in internal control over financial reporting that we consider to be significant deficiencies.

A control deficiency exists when the design or operation of a control does not allow management or employees, in the normal course of performing their assigned functions, to prevent or detect misstatements on a timely basis. A significant deficiency is a control deficiency, or a combination of control deficiencies, that adversely affects the District's ability to initiate, authorize, record, process, or report financial data reliably in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles such that there is more than a remote likelihood that a misstatement of the District's financial statements that is more than inconsequential will not be prevented or detected by the District's internal control. We consider the deficiencies described in the accompanying schedule of findings and questioned costs as items 2008-1 and 2008-2 to be significant deficiencies in internal control over financial reporting

A material weakness is a significant deficiency, or a combination or significant deficiencies, that results in more than a remote likelihood that a material misstatement of the financial statements will not be prevented or detected by the District's internal control.

Our consideration of internal control over financial reporting was for the limited purpose described in the first paragraph of this section and would not necessarily identify all deficiencies in internal control that might be significant deficiencies and, accordingly, would not necessarily disclose all significant deficiencies that are also considered to be material weaknesses. However, we believe that none of the significant deficiencies described in the schedule of findings and questioned costs are material weaknesses.

Compliance and Other Matters

As part of obtaining reasonable assurance about whether Freedom Area School District's financial statements are free of material misstatement, we performed tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts, and grant agreements, noncompliance with which could have a direct and material effect on the determination of financial statement amounts. However, providing an opinion on compliance with those provisions was not an objective of our audit, and accordingly, we do not express such an opinion. The results of our tests disclosed no instances of noncompliance or other matters that are required to be reported under *Government Auditing Standards*.

The District's responses to the findings identified in our audit are described in the accompanying schedule of findings and questioned costs. We did not audit the District's responses and, accordingly, we express no opinion on them.

Financial Statement Findings:

2008-1 Financial Statement Preparation

Condition: The District has historically relied upon its auditors to assist in the preparation of the

government-wide financial statements and footnotes as part of its external financial reporting process. Accordingly, the District's ability to prepare financial statements in accordance with GAAP is based, in part, on its reliance on its external auditors, who

cannot by definition be considered part of the District's internal controls.

Criteria: Pursuant to SAS 112, Communicating Internal Control Matters Identified in an Audit,

we are required to report on whether the District is able to prepare financial statements in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles (GAAP). The preparation of financial statements in accordance with GAAP requires internal controls over both (1) recording, processing, and summarizing accounting data, and (2) reporting government-

wide and fund financial statements, including the related footnotes.

Cause: The additional costs with hiring staff experienced in preparing financial statements, along

with additional training time, outweigh the derived benefits.

Recommendation: The District should continue to evaluate the cost/benefit of outsourcing the task of

preparing the financial statements to the external auditors.

Management

Response: The District has evaluated the cost/benefit of outsourcing the task of preparing the

financial statements to the auditors. The District has determined that it is in the best interest of the District to continue to do so. The District will carefully review the draft of the financial statements and notes prior to approving them and accept responsibility

for their content and presentation.

2008-2 Number and Type of Journal Entries

Condition: During our audit, we identified and proposed material and nonmaterial adjustments,

which were approved and posted by management.

Criteria: Pursuant to SAS 112, Communicating Internal Control Matters Identified in an Audit,

we are required to report a significant deficiency if the auditor identifies a material misstatement in the financial statements that were not initially identified by the District's

internal controls, even if management subsequently corrects the misstatement.

Cause: Various account balances needed auditor adjustments in order to produce financial

procedures in place to determine the proper handling of unusual an infrequent

transactions.

Management

Response: The District will attempt to add additional procedures to correct and detect misstatements

in the general ledger.
